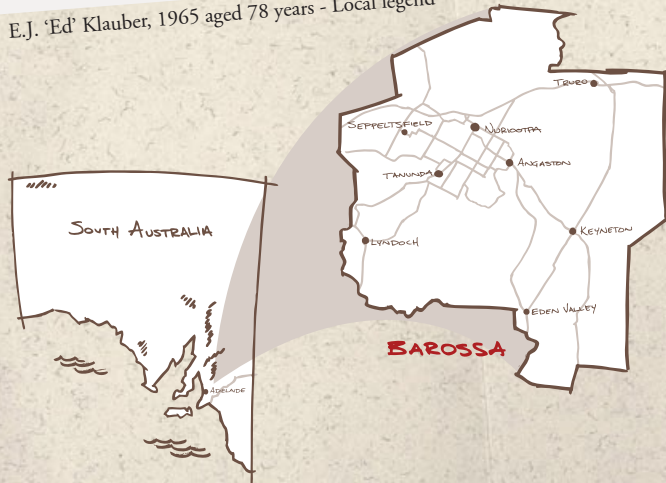




All our growers want is to taste their grapes in the wine

Born from a love of the Barossa and a desire to nurture the little things that make the region the winemaking pinnacle and community that it is today, three local wine families - the Lindners, the Bitters and the Hill Smiths, joined forces for a Barossa adventure.

Hand crafted by family winemakers, who together have 230+ years of wine wisdom, and championing two key regional varietals, Shiraz and Cabernet Sauvignon, the Barossa Earthworks wines reflect the true essence of the Barossa; authenticity – of variety, of place, of character; because the people who grow the grapes and make the wine live and breathe in the famous region.

The fruit for these two wines is sourced from some of the great “micro-vineyards” in the Barossa. Averaging five hectares in size and tended by local family grape growers; some like the Lindner, Bitter and Hill Smith families are fourth, fifth and sixth generation Barossans.

“In supporting the small Barossa family vigneron and providing them with a profitable return, we are supporting our great community from the ground up. The Barossa is represented by some 750 families, of which half grow 10 hectares or less.” *James Lindner.*

“We are reinforcing tried and tested grape growing and winemaking traditions that have become a little clouded by the world’s growing commercialism.
